Freedom of information request

Thank you for your email of 4th October 2016 requesting information about scoring for applicants from England, Wales and Northern Ireland for Medicine.

The University of Edinburgh Medical School is renowned for preparing its students to be world class doctors. The MBChB programme curriculum aims to ensure that our graduates are caring, competent, confident and reflective practitioners, and are able to function at the highest level in academic, hospital or community settings. We have interpreted your request as asking for statistics relating to students with a fee status of England, Wales and Northern Ireland, known as Rest of UK (RUK).

You asked for statistics relating to applications for the last five admission cycles. You should note that the scoring system is reviewed annually and updated where appropriate, so the criteria for assessment is not necessarily identical.

Offers and Acceptances (question 4)

You asked how many offers were given to RUK applicants and what percentage of these offer-holders go on to take up a place at the medical school. Lowest application scores for successful Rest of UK Applicants (question 1)

You asked what was the lowest score each year (out of 40) assigned to a successful RUK applicants and how many successful applicants were assigned that score that year, for the cycles 2011/12, 2012/13, 2013/14, 2014/15 and 2015/16. Scoring out of 40 only existed from 2014 entry onwards. Prior to that, the score was out of 37. Please note that there will be applicants who are unsuccessful who have achieved higher scores than this. This is because offer-making is an iterative process, with initial offers made to the highest scoring candidates across the sector and any subsequent vacancies are then available to be offered to candidates who do not hold an offer elsewhere.

In each case the number of applicants with the lowest application score was less than 5. I have not provided the exact number because disclosing these low numbers could enable individuals to be identified. This would breach the data protection principles set out in the Data Protection Act 1998. The Freedom of Information (Scotland) Act 2002 does not require us to provide this sort of information as it is exempt under section 38(1)(b).

Lowest UKCAT scores for successful RUK Applicants with the lowest overall application score (question 2)

You asked of the successful RUK applicants who were assigned the score in table 2 above, what was the lowest UKCAT score achieved.

Non-academic scoring (question 5)

You asked what percentage of applicants were awarded a score for their personal statement and reference of 6/6. Not every cycle has had the same scoring system. Cycles 2013/14 and 2015/16 are the two which have used the 6/6 scoring. Therefore I have provided you with data on the percentage of applicants obtaining maximum marks, regardless of the numerical value of the score.

Total Application Scores (questions 6 and 7)

You asked what number of applicants gained a score of 40/40, 39/40, 38/40, 37/40, 36/40 and 35/40. As mentioned previously, prior to 2013/14 scoring was out of 37 and therefore have provided data based on the assumption you wish to see the same number of scores below the total.
